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**5. INFORMATIONAL ITEMS**

- a. *Report from WRA Chair* – Chair Marble reported on the water resources team meeting he attended for the upcoming Sacramento Metro Chamber’s CAP-to-CAP trip to Washington, DC. The water resources team will be emphasizing two or three regional projects this year. The projects will be the Davis-Woodland Water Supply Project, Sacramento’s sanitation district issues and possibly a third project yet to be determined. For the first time, monthly meetings co-chaired by the water resources and flood protection teams will begin coordinating flood and water issues in the greater Sacramento area. They will discuss issues beyond the scope of the CAP-to-CAP trip. Both Bill Marble and Tim O’Halloran will be in attendance.
- b. *WRA Annual Newsletter: The Year in Review 2010* - Donna presented the 2010 newsletter, which highlighted regional projects and regional issues that the WRA focused on during the past year. Each year the newsletter is broadly mailed to elected and city officials, as well as the WRA’s normal distribution list. It is also available on the WRA’s website.

**6. UPDATE on WATER LEGISLATION & REGULATORY ISSUES**

Tim O’Halloran reported that the YCFC&WCD has applied on behalf of the WRA to DWR’s California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring Program (CASGEM) as the regional monitoring entity. The entire Yolo County area is covered including RD 108. Discussions with RD999 and other local reclamation districts are being held to determine their desired level of participation in the program. Currently all districts within Yolo County were included in the monitoring coverage area submitted to DWR. Tim has also been in contact with the Yolo County Farm Bureau’s Denise Sagara, who was concerned about farmers that may not be currently covered within the WRA’s designated monitoring area. Tim assured her that interested farmers could participate if they contribute financially to the Yolo County Groundwater Monitoring Program. Tim is working with Denise to determine an appropriate contribution level for farmers.

Tim reported that the new legislative session has begun. Senator Simitian’s placeholder bill on water user fees is being tracked through organizations such as NCWA. Senator Huffman is talking about some new groundwater legislation. Tim also informed that DWR is writing the regulations for the 2009 water use efficiency legislation. The agricultural component may have cost consequences depending on DWR’s interpretation of the legislation. RD108 has been very active and vocal in monitoring these consequences. A recently released report from the Delta Watermaster focused on reasonable and beneficial water use that is raising concerns for agricultural water managers. Concerns raised by the report reinforce that local water managers need to be organized and strategic to address upcoming issues.

**7. WRA TECHNICAL COMMITTEE (TC) UPDATE**

- a. *Status of Yolo County IRWMP Process Update* - Jacques De Bra, TC Chair, reported there has been excellent participation in the Integrated Regional Water Management Plan (IRWMP) update by all TC representatives. A simplified draft list of priority projects to be implemented by 2020 was distributed. Each Integrated Action lead agency provided a 2010 status update on their projects since the 2007 IRWMP. Jacques explained the draft list and requested comments from the Board. The TC is still receiving updates and will finalize the list for Board approval at a future meeting. Chair Marble noted that the list was not ranked or prioritized in any way. Projects were organized under each of the eight Integrated Actions as published in the IRWMP. The TC is reviewing draft procedures to approach prioritizing of projects. Cindy Tuttle summarized the procedure used by the Yolo County Transportation

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District that the TC is considering. She explained how the priorities were organized based on the funding criteria related to specific funding opportunities. The WRA Technical Committee and Executive Committee will review these guideline procedures for prioritizing as they are developed.

- b. *Status of Westside Regional Water Management Group/Prop. 84 Funding* – The Westside submitted a \$1 million planning grant application to DWR in September 2009. Those funds would be used to develop a Westside IRWMP. Formal award notification is pending later this month. The Westside RWMG established a coordinating committee with representatives from each of the five counties as the working body for the Westside. Chad Roberts requested to be on the Westside mailing list. Chair Marble inquired when funds would be available. Jacques believes it would be 6 to 9 months after the official award announcement.

**8. PRESENTATION: *Responding to Water Policies & Regulations Impacting the Sacramento Valley***

Tim O'Halloran introduced David Guy, the Executive Director of the Northern California Water Association. David has been instrumental in developing a regional, sustainable strategic plan to address the many issues facing water managers today and in the near future. David gave an update on the various Bay-Delta activities and planning processes underway due to recent legislation that impacts Northern California. He described how water moves through the Delta and the environmental sustainability issues affecting the Delta system. The objective is to move water through the Delta in a way that benefits fish and other aquatic species while protecting a sustainable water supply for Northern California. The declining Delta smelt population is representative of all Delta species and the declining health of the system. David likens the Bay-Delta in crisis to a tangled web with a myriad of linked elements. Recent legislation affects all water purveyors, water dischargers, and local governments in California. Stakeholders are being affected by threatening water rights and supplies; usurping local land use authority, and creating new challenges for dischargers. Active engagement and sophisticated strategies will be critical to protecting water supplies, while preserving local authorities. David emphasized the two major issues impacting water managers are flows and fees. There could be forced reductions in water flows in order to add water to the Delta and fix problems, which would in turn incur higher costs by assessing fees on diversions and certain land use to fund Delta programs.

In 2009, the Delta Reform Act (a package of Delta legislation) addressed the water infrastructure crisis by requiring the reorganization of the state's management of the Delta watershed. There are numerous State agencies involved in the implementation of the legislation. Determining Delta flow criteria is a cornerstone piece of the planning decisions for the Delta Plan and the Bay-Delta Conservation Plan. The State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) adopted the new flow criteria in a report to the legislature (but not a regulatory action at this time). Based on the flow criteria in the informational report, it would require 6 million acre feet of water to implement the proposal; 4 million would likely come from the Sacramento Valley. The legislature only charged the SWRCB to determine what it would take to satisfy fish in the Delta without regard for all the other needs of the Delta for the California. The SWRCB is beginning its regulatory process and is starting with the Bay-Delta Water Quality Control Plan. They are doing a technical review of San Joaquin River flows and salinity objectives. The next phase will include the Sacramento River. After the SWRCB sets flow objectives, a water rights proceeding would be implemented which requires stakeholders to forgo diversions, give up stormwater or provide water in some way for Delta needs. NCWA is monitoring this process closely and has suggested to the SWRCB that there are no redirected impacts to Sacramento River. The Delta Watermaster position was created by the Delta Reform Act. The position is intended to enforce the Delta water rights. An initial report was released by the Watermaster that discussed a reasonable use doctrine. The report stated that if you are using agricultural water inefficiently and therefore wasting water, then you

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would lose that portion of your water rights. David summarized the Delta Stewardship Council's process to develop the Delta Plan. An interim plan was adopted in August 2010. The long-term plan is scheduled to be adopted by January 2012. It has yet to be determined whether/how the flows and fees from the SWRCB will be incorporated in the Delta Plan.

David discussed a strategy for moving forward and how we can come together as a region to advance the economic, social and environmental sustainability of the Sacramento Valley by enhancing and preserving its water rights, supplies and water quality for its cities and communities. Protecting water rights is very important. There is ongoing litigation on Sacramento River water rights settlement contracts. This is basically an effort by a Federal agency and Bay area stakeholders to undermine Northern California water rights. This is one of many active legal proceedings regarding Sacramento River water rights. David talked about the overarching strategy of regional sustainability and self reliance, which is now part of the State's policy and strategy for Delta management (Water Code §85021). The NCWA Board of Directors adopted a Bay-Delta policy in 2006 with input from water managers throughout the region. David outlined the current advocacy components of the Sacramento Valley strategy to develop a solution for regional sustainability. He discussed each of these components, which are:

- Efficient Water Management (Water Management Task Force developing a technical report)
- Biological Enhancements (aquatic & terrestrial; Sacramento Valley flows, explore new flow options)
- Active Groundwater/Conjunctive Management
- Investments in Flood Protection
- Water Quality Improvements
- Storage Opportunities (Sites Reservoir project)
- Legal/Institutional Framework (fees, fiscal issues, legislative policies)
- Information Management (communications strategy, tours, traditional & social media)

David answered questions from the Board and public. (David's presentation is available on the WRA's website - [http://www.yolowra.org/meeting\\_directors.html](http://www.yolowra.org/meeting_directors.html)).

- 9. UPDATE from Woodland-Davis Clean Water Agency (WDCWA) on WDCWA-Conaway Agreements,** Eric Mische, General Manager WDCWA, gave an update on the recent Conaway Ranch agreements with WDCWA. He gave an overview of the key objectives of the Davis-Woodland Water Supply Project (DWWSP). Negotiations with Conaway Ranch have been ongoing for the past year. The Conaway agreement was negotiated to meet project objectives related to the intake site, pipeline easements and summer water transfer using senior water rights. Eric discussed the objectives of the agreement that included acquiring: permanent senior water rights, river intake site and arrange for screened intake construction, pipeline and associated right-of-way easements and environmental mitigation land for project construction. The negotiating parties are WDCWA, Conaway Preservation Group, Tri-City Water and Farm, Reclamation District 2035 and the Cities of Davis and Woodland. There were five separate agreements negotiated. Eric discussed the details of each of the agreements in his presentation, which are:
1. Joint Diversion and Intake Agreement with RD 2035
  2. Agreement for Conveyance of Real Property and Easements with RD 2035, Tri-City and CPG
  3. Water Agreement with Tri-City and CPG
  4. Installment Purchase Agreement with City of Davis
  5. Installment Purchase Agreement with City of Woodland

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The intake facilities will be jointly operated by Conaway and WDCWA. Each party will be responsible for the operation and maintenance costs for their separate facilities. The common facilities have a cost sharing agreement: RD2035 (80% share) and agencies (20% share). RD 2035 will be funding their separate facility through grants (U.S. Bureau of Land Management and CA Dept. of Fish & Game). The cities will fund their separate facilities through rates, bonds and future grant opportunities. Some of the key aspects of the water agreement are: WDCWA buys 10,000 af/yr of senior water rights effective January 2016 with a maximum of 7,500 available for July through September and the Agency pays \$2,600,000/year for 24 years (2016-39). After 24 years the Agency owns the water rights free and clear. All the agreements are subject to approval from the SWRCB and the Bureau of Reclamation, which could take several years. Chair Marble asked Eric to answer questions after the County's presentation. **10. UPDATE from Yolo County on Yolo County-Conaway Agreement**

Matt Rexroad, Yolo County Supervisor, distributed a copy of the agreement between Yolo County and Tri-City Water and Farm regarding Conaway Ranch that was passed by the Board (3-2 vote) on December 16, 2010 (available on WRA's website). Matt explained that there was much public concern expressed about how quickly the County came to this agreement. The County moved quickly because they saw an opportunity to resolve some of their issues regarding the property. Tri-City also wanted the County to sign-off on the agreement. It was appropriate for the County to do this prior to WDCWA adopting their Conaway Ranch agreements on December 20<sup>th</sup>. Matt expressed that this agreement does not dissolve any existing authorities of Yolo County. He reviewed the major points of the agreement and addressed some of the points of contention expressed by the public. Yolo County does not have jurisdiction over any water transfers owned by a private property owner. He argued that the water transfers under this agreement could legally take place with or without Yolo County at the table. The same concept applies to easements. Currently private property owners have the authority to sell easements, especially to a federal or state agency without County approval. Matt continued to review each section of the agreement. Matt invited Dirk Brazil, Deputy County Administrator, to add any additional comments.

Chair Marble made the point that both of these agencies vetted the adopted agreements in a public meeting and asked the audience not to re-argue issues presented at those meetings. He emphasized that the point of having this topic on the WRA agenda was to inform and educate WRA members and the public about the agreements. He opened the floor for questions and comments on both the WDCWA and Yolo County updates.

1. **Call to Order:** Meeting was called to order by Bill Marble at 12:30 pm.
2. **Approve Agenda and Adding Items to the Posted Agenda:** Agenda approved as presented.
3. **Public Comment:** No public comment.
4. **Administrative Items:**
  - a) *November 2010 financials reviewed.* Donna reviewed the amendments to the “Other income/expenses” section needed to the 2010-11 budget relating to the Westside/Proposition 84 MOU agreement. She will draft a staff report explaining the amendments for the January 10<sup>th</sup> meeting for Board approval.
  - b) *November 8, 2010 EC minutes* were approved.
  - c) *Payments to approve* - All payments were approved
  - d) *Review draft WRA Newsletter: The Year in Review 2010* – The EC provided suggestions for changes to the financial summary section. They directed Donna to keep the IRWMP Integrated Projects page to regional projects versus individual agency projects and discussed several. Donna is still working on acquiring photos that coordinate with the text. A revised draft will be emailed to the EC next week.
5. **Update on Water Legislation & Regulatory Issues** (Tim O’Halloran) – Tim reported on outreach to Reclamation Districts 108 and 999 to participate in Yolo County Groundwater Monitoring Program that will provide data for the California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring Program (CASGEM). Tim and his staff are developing a draft monitoring boundary map for CASGEM that will need to be submitted to DWR in January. Donna is coordinating with Max Stevenson to submit the online CASGEM monitoring entity designation to DWR next week.

Tim also spoke with the Yolo County Farm Bureau (YCFB) and discussed the benefits of them participating and contributing to the Yolo County Groundwater Monitoring Program. An appropriate fee schedule will need to be determined for the YCFB’s contribution. They participate in the irrigated lands program and will need to utilize groundwater data. Tim informed that with the retirement of Rick Landon, consultant to the irrigated lands program, the YCFB asked the YCFCWCD to fill his role. YCFCWCD staff currently has a full work load and Tim suggested hiring a technical person to fill this role. He suggested this could be incorporated in the WRA’s project budget next year with a cost shared by the WRA, YCFB and YCFCWCD (+??). This position has a direct linkage to the Yolo County Groundwater Monitoring Program – an IRWMP foundational action.

Tim reported that the legislature is back in session. Senator Simitian’s proposed water infrastructure and fees bill was re-submitted (SB 34). Senator Pavely is planning to re-introduce her water bill from the 2009-10 session (SB 229 – water: diversion and use: groundwater).

6. **Update on Technical Committee Activities** (Jacques De Bra) – Jacques informed that the Projects to be Implemented by 2020 list is being updated. The Technical Committee agreed that this list was not complete at their last meeting. After this list is updated, the next step is for agencies to submit project information that demonstrates the project’s readiness to be implemented. The 2020 List will be reviewed by the Technical Committee and presented to the Board for approval in January 2010. Jacques indicated that Yolo County has been re-engaged in the WRA TC with the addition of Cindy Tuttle. Donna is working with WRA member agency staff to acquire updated information for the 2020

list. She will be updating this list over the next several weeks. Bill asked about the status of Bob Schneider's mercury project presented to the EC earlier in the year. This project became the "Inter-regional Mercury Plan for Sacramento River" that was submitted by the Sacramento River Watershed Program during the Proposition 84 Round 1 Planning grant applications. Jacques will speak with Stephen McCord/Larry Walker Associates, who last presented this proposal to the WRA TC.

**7. Update on Proposition 84 Funding /Westside RWMG (Jacques De Bra)**

*Prop. 84 IRWM Planning Grant, Round 1, submitted 9/28/10* - Jacques reported that the Westside RWMG is finalizing a RFQ process for the Prop. 84 Round 1 planning grant that has been recommended for funding to complete a Westside IRWMP. Once funding has been officially approved (anticipated in early January), the RFQ process will transform to a RFP. The IRWMP must be completed two years from the date a contract is signed.

*Prop. 84 IRWM Implementation Grant, Round 1, deadline 1/7/11* - Jacques reiterated that only Yolo and Solano Counties were eligible to pursue an implementation grant at this time. There were two project proposals presented for the application for Yolo County by Putah Creek and the YCFCWCD. Solano did not submit any projects for consideration to the Westside RWMG. Jacques and Tim relayed several challenges and concerns to finalizing an application by the January deadline. SCWA has expressed concerns about what projects might be selected for future rounds of funding should Yolo County decide to pursue an application in this round (e.g. then Yolo County would not apply for a future round if a grant was awarded to them in Round 1). Future funding pots will be smaller after the Round 1 awards, therefore more competitive. Tim has concerns that the YCFCWCD will not be able to prepare a strong application under the current timeline. He also expressed concerns about preserving the relationships that have been established in the Westside group. Jacques reminded that SB 855 has allocated additional funding for IRWM implementation projects that will add to available State funds. Jacques and Tim presented two different perspectives on whether or not to apply for a Round 1 Implementation grant. A meeting is scheduled this afternoon between Tim and Fran Borcalli to discuss the application. Bill suggested Jacques attend this meeting as well to further discuss the application. A final decision whether to apply will be pending the result of this meeting's discussions. The final decision belongs to the YCFCWCD since they would be the lead applicant and have the responsibility of completing the work.



1. **Call to Order:** Meeting was called to order by Bill Marble at 12:30 pm.
2. **Approve Agenda and Adding Items to the Posted Agenda:** Agenda approved as presented.
3. **Public Comment:** No public comment.
4. **Administrative Items:**
  - a) December 2010 –January 2011 financials were reviewed.
  - b) December 17, 2010 EC minutes were approved.
  - c) Payments to approve - All payments were approved
  - d) Kaiser Contract renewal for 2011-12: Donna informed that the Kaiser contract for health coverage is pending renewal on 4/1/11. There is a combined 4.75% increase in the Kaiser and Delta Dental monthly premium. In order for the WRA to qualify for small business health coverage, there must be 2 employees on the plan. This requirement has been satisfied by one of the board of directors being offered the health plan, which they can then decline. Kurt has served this role in the past, but another member of the Board and/or Executive Committee could also do this.  
Computer Software Upgrade: Donna informed that QuickBooks is mandating all users of QuickBooks Pro 2008 to upgrade to the current version by May 2011. Otherwise the WRA could not continue utilizing the payroll functions. The upgrade cost is \$175.00. Donna will research whether QuickBooks Pro 2011 can be purchased at Costco at a discount. Costco only accepts American Express credit cards and the WRA has a Mastercard. The last upgrade was purchased by Donna using her personal credit card and she was reimbursed. (*Post meeting note:* Costco is offering a \$75 discount coupon until 2/27/11 for a total purchase price of \$100.00.)  
  
The software used to maintain and edit the WRA website, Macromedia Contribute 3, also needs to be upgraded since Macromedia was bought out by Adobe. It would be prudent to upgrade the 6 year old software for \$99.00 (limited time offer). (*Post meeting note:* The non-upgrade cost of the current Adobe Contribute CS5 software is \$199.00.)
5. **Discuss status of California budget and potential impacts to local agencies:** The EC held a general discussion and shared information on the status of the California budget. It is not anticipated that DWR's funding will be greatly impacted. DWR is not waiting on bond sales to fund their flood programs. There is supposedly sufficient cash on hand to administer all the currently scheduled programs for this fiscal year.
6. **Discuss CAP-to-CAP April 2011 funding priorities for Yolo County:** Jacques informed that there will be three main Yolo County funding priorities merged with the regional Sacramento Valley needs being presented by the Regional Water Authority (RWA). Those priorities are: RD 2035 intake project (\$5 million construction); Davis Woodland Water Supply Project (DWWSP) regional water treatment plant final design (\$6.5 million); and Yolo County governance support for the Delta County Coalition (\$2.5 million). It has yet to be determined whether any mercury projects will be presented. Congress,

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however, has closed the door on the traditional earmark request process. The CAP-to-CAP water resources team will be meeting this month to discuss a strategy since the Federal appropriations requests process will not be “business as usual” as compared to previous years. Also CAP-to-CAP is scheduled to be held in early May not April this year.

**7. Update on Water Legislation & Regulatory Issues (Tim O’Halloran)**

a) Discuss future water bond: Can WRA projects be included? Tim has discussed the water bond’s status with other water managers and political leaders. It is questionable whether the water bond will resurface on future ballots. If it does, the word is that nothing would be added to the bond, but possibly cut. It is not likely that WRA projects could secure funding through the water bond initiative if it resurfaces. Tim and other water managers continue to monitor regulatory issues, such as water user fees and water rights. The State Board will review the remaining DWWSP water rights protest. A final decision is not expected at their February meeting.

**8. Technical Committee Update (Jacques De Bra) – Discussion items.**

a) Discuss options for regional funding support (including lobbyist role for key IRWMP initiative) Jacques lead the discussion on the possibility of pursuing a collaborative approach to secure Federal and State funding for Yolo County priorities by pooling resources to hire lobbying services firm for FY 2011-12. He presented a proposal for discussion and information about the Ferguson Group as an example. The proposal outlined possible funding partners, a sample budget and cost sharing benefits. Jacques emphasized that this proposal does not preclude any individual agency from pursuing outside funding. This concept has surfaced for discussion over the last several years at the WRA Technical Committee, the WRA Board and during Cap-to-Cap. It was noted that Yolo County has been without a lobbyist for two years due to budget constraints. A variety of questions were raised. What WRA member agencies are currently involved in lobbying efforts? Would it be more cost effective for the WRA to join an association like NCWA to represent our interests? Do WRA member agencies have enough of a need to fund this effort collaboratively through the WRA? Does the WRA have any constraints stated in their by-laws that would preclude the association being able to pursue this effort? How much might the WRA contribute to the funding of cost sharing?

The Executive Committee members provided their feedback. If partially funded by WRA budget, some member agencies might complain if they do not feel their agency will benefit from or needs these services. “Pay-to-play” funding, as with the groundwater program, may be the preferred option. If the 2011-12 will be a “flat” budget without a dues increase, would this impact the WRA’s ability to fund these services? This proposal could be an informational item on the March Board agenda, possibly with a presentation from the Ferguson firm.

The Executive Committee agreed on the following follow-up to Jacques’ proposal:

- Determine whether there is any restriction in the WRA bylaws on lobbying efforts (Donna/Jacques)
- Have a discussion with each WRA member agency to determine interest and need (Jacques)
- Pending on outcome of above, move forward with presentation to WRA Board for consideration



1. **CALL TO ORDER** by Jacques De Bra.
2. **APPROVAL AGENDA & Adding Items to Posted Agenda:** Approved as presented.
3. **APPROVE MEETING MINUTES:** Previous meeting minutes were emailed to the TC for review with today's agenda. Comments on the 11/4/10 draft minutes are due by 12/6/10.
4. **PUBLIC COMMENT:** There were no comments from the public.
5. **INFORMATION ITEM:** The City of Woodland's draft Groundwater Management Plan is available for review and comment by 12/17/10. The plan can be accessed online at: [www.yolowra.org](http://www.yolowra.org) and [www.cityofwoodland.org](http://www.cityofwoodland.org). Woodland City Council will consider adopting the plan in January 2011.
6. **DWR UPDATE:** Bill Brewster, DWR, gave an update on the CASGEM groundwater monitoring program. DWR is processing public comments on the draft guidelines. The comments will be addressed in a Frequently Asked Questions format. The final guidelines will be released December 15 with incorporated changes and will be posted online. The CASGEM online submittal system will be available on December 15<sup>th</sup>. If anyone has questions or issues about the program, you can contact Bill or Chris Bond, the regional representative.

IRWMP Planning Grant application evaluations and preliminary funding recommendations will be available by 12/8/10, followed by a public comment period until 12/23. There will be a public meeting held in Sacramento on 12/15 to discuss the award recommendations. The final grant awards should be posted by mid-January.

Frequently Asked Questions will be posted by the end of this week from the implementation grant workshop. DWR released an addendum to the implementation grant related to the additional \$100 million grant funds allocated per SB 855 for IRWM implementation funding. Grant applicants should review the addendum, because there are some additional questions related to whether or not an applicant receives Delta water. An applicant must answer these Delta water related questions or their application will be considered incomplete. The deadline for the implementation grant application has not changed, which is 1/7/11.

7. **WATER LEGISLATION & REGULATORY ISSUES UPDATE:** This item was not discussed. Tim O'Halloran is attending ACWA this week.
8. **UPDATE on PROPOSITION 84 GRANTS and WESTSIDE RWMG:** Jacques gave an update on proposals for the Round 1 Implementation Grant application. The Westside RWMG received two proposals from Yolo County for consideration: a Putah Creek channel restoration project and a Yolo County Flood Control & Water Conservation District (YCFWCWD) conjunctive use project. Solano County decided not to pursue funding during this round. The Westside Regional Water Management Group (RWMG) met recently and discussed the WRA's intention to apply for Round 1 implementation grant funding. DWR will want support demonstrated for an application by all of the Westside partners. The Westside group discussed a "gentlemen's agreement", whereby if Yolo County was successful in receiving a grant this round, Yolo County would "step-back" to allow other Westside partners to pursue funding in subsequent rounds; however that agreement would not be in perpetuity (equity over time will be taken into consideration). Jacques will be meeting with DWR next week to clarify application details and the Westside RWMG will hold a follow-up conference call. The lead partner that applies for funding will have 100% financial responsibility for the local cost share and grant application preparation costs. The question was asked if there are two projects submitted on one application, whether one of the two could receive grant funding. Bill Brewster indicated that DWR would not pick and choose from components on one application. It would be all or nothing if awarded. If an application does not receive the full funding requested, then it would be the applicant's choice how to re-assign the grant funds. Jacques will also ask DWR if an application includes a weak project proposal will that impact the stronger project proposal component. The Westside RWMG is preparing a consultant Statement of Qualifications request pending grant award notifications.
9. **YOLO COUNTY IRWMP UPDATE PROCESS:**
  - a) Discuss priority prioritization process: Cindy Tuttle summarized the process the Yolo County Transportation District (YCTD) used to assist their project prioritization decision-making (handout distributed). She said this process worked very well for them and suggested the TC develop something similar. The TC needs to be able to provide a list of priority projects quickly with the flexibility to tailor the list to specific funding opportunities as they arise. The

YCTD experienced similar challenges to the WRA prioritizing transportation projects – different project aspects, competing interests for limited funding, and identifying the best projects for specific funding sources. For example, elected officials ask staff for a list of priority projects each year to satisfy Federal and State appropriation’s requests. Jacques asked Cindy to provide their final priority list with scoring and ranking information. Jacques reiterated that the TC should be focusing on “active” Yolo County IRWMP projects. One criterion that would assist in determining a project’s level of readiness is whether their environmental compliance has been completed. In order to pursue implementation grant funds, the project would need a completed EIR or have the process started. Cindy offered to draft a similar prioritization structure for the WRA and present to the TC meeting in January.

- b) Finalize 2010-2020 Priority List: Donna informed that she is updating the IRWMP actions spreadsheets with missing information as it is provided to her. The spreadsheets are being reformatted to simplify and streamline data input. She will update the 2020 Priority List for TC review at the January meeting and for presentation to the Board on January 10<sup>th</sup>. This is intended to be a list of active projects. Projects that do not demonstrate activity will be removed from this list and remain on the master list of actions. Projects were categorized on this list if a “completion date” was listed on the spreadsheet. Cindy noted that some projects are ongoing, such as invasive species removal, and do not have a specific end date. Those projects are active as funding becomes available and should be listed on the priority list. The spreadsheets are intended to document the progress of projects as it completes identifiable stages (concept, planning, design, permitting, construction etc.). Jacques mentioned that the “Accomplishments” list documented one-time (e.g. water meter installation) and programmatic (e.g. subsidence monitoring) accomplishments.
- c) Lead agencies provide scope, schedule & budget information for 2010-20 Priority List: Agencies will be asked to provide scope, schedule and budget information for projects after the 2020 Priority List is finalized. This information will be compiled and presented to the Board in May or June.

### 10. UPDATE on WRA FUNDED FY2010-11 PROJECT ACTIONS:

Donna will contact the lead agencies for active projects to submit their October to December 2010 invoicing to the WRA by mid-January.

- *Surface Water Monitoring Program* – The YCFCWCD will present a sample strategic approach for development of the surface water monitoring program. This will be presented to the TC in February or March. Max mentioned that Solano County Water Agency does surface water monitoring and may provide a possible model.

- 1. CALL TO ORDER** by Jacques De Bra.
- 2. APPROVAL AGENDA & Adding Items to Posted Agenda:** Approved as presented.
- 3. APPROVE MEETING MINUTES:** Previous meeting minutes were emailed to the TC for review with today's agenda. Comments on the 12/2/10 draft minutes are due by 1/10/11.
- 4. PUBLIC COMMENT:** Dave Pratt inquired about the decision-making process that the TC follows to select which projects qualify to apply for grant opportunities. Jacques indicated that this will be discussed/answered under item #8 on today's agenda.
- 5. DWR UPDATE:** Bill Brewster was unable to attend today's meeting. Stefan Lorenzato informed that Stein Buer is now the deputy director of the FloodSAFE California program.
- 6. WATER LEGISLATION & REGULATORY ISSUES UPDATE:** Tim O'Halloran informed the legislature is in a quiet period right now. Senator Simitian is laying the ground work for a water fees bill later in the year. The YCFCWCD has been tracking regulatory issues related to beneficial use and water use efficiency, specifically DWR's draft emergency regulations. DWR's interpretation of SBx7 could have major economic impacts on agriculture and water districts if they decide to enforce agricultural water measurement methods. RD 108, along with other ag water districts, is also actively involved in these discussions and closing monitoring the implementation of legislation. Tim also discussed how the Delta Stewardship Council's Delta Plan development is creating confusion with overlapping responsibilities for administering the legislation. The 2009 legislation created a Delta Water Master position, who has released a report on regional beneficial use that

raises jurisdictional questions which could have detrimental impacts for ag water users. This topic correlates to David Guy's presentation to the WRA Board on January 10<sup>th</sup>.

Cindy Tuttle echoed Tim's concern about the confusion of overlapping Delta jurisdictional responsibilities. Yolo County staff continues to actively monitor Delta activities and legislation. Locals are hoping to have a stronger voice in the Bay Delta Conservation Plan process especially now with the new incoming Governor wanting locals to take a more active role in governance. Cindy also informed that Senator Wolk has agreed to carry legislation related to the Cache Creek Resources Management Plan to extend the sunset deadline beyond 2012 to 2026. When the bill is written, Cindy will bring it to the WRA TC for review and then to the WRA Board for endorsement.

**7. UPDATE on the California Statewide Groundwater Elevation Monitoring Program (CASGEM):**

Tim O'Halloran reported that a letter of intent has been submitted to DWR for the WRA to be the lead monitoring entity. A geographic map was also submitted outlining the intended monitoring area which includes all of Yolo County and RD 108 (Yolo and Colusa county areas). The intent was to have the map be inclusive and if any entity does not wish to be included they are welcome to opt out. Mark Hardesty, RD 2068, indicated that they would be included under Solano County Water Agency's existing groundwater monitoring program (Yolo and Solano areas). Max Stevenson discussed the CASGEM guidelines related to the type, number and density of wells to be monitored. The program requires much fewer wells (10-15 per 300 sq. mile) compared to what Yolo County typically monitors (150 per 300 sq. mile). DWR will require a detailed monitoring plan to be submitted later this year. Tim has discussed with the Yolo County Farm Bureau (YCFB) about participating in the groundwater monitoring program. They are interested and agreed to contribute to the monitoring program. A reasonable fee will be determined for the YCFB's contribution. (Post meeting note: it was not discussed who would invoice the YCFB – the WRA or YCFWCD.) Jacques gave a brief overview about the establishment of supplemental funding to maintain the Yolo County Groundwater Monitoring Program.

**8. UPDATE on PROPOSITION 84 GRANTS and WESTSIDE Regional Water Management Group (RWMG):**

Jacques De Bra reminded that the Westside RWMG submitted a Prop 84 planning grant application in September 2010. DWR released preliminary recommendations in December including a \$1 million planning grant award to the Westside RWMG. Final recommendations are anticipated in January 2011. The Westside RWMG is developing a Statement of Qualifications (SOQ) and Request for Proposal (RFP) process to hire a firm to prepare a regional Westside IRWMP, which is expected to take 2 years. Stefan asked whether the SOQ solicitation will be circulated to the WRA TC. Jacques indicated that it could be distributed to the TC when finalized. Currently the Westside RWMG is preparing a scoring system to rate the submittals received. The top candidates will be invited back to submit an RFP. Jacques asked the TC to think about how they want to interface with the Westside process and let him know. It could be as simple as a standing item on the TC agenda for updates or something more involved. The public outreach process will likely be very different from the Yolo County IRWMP given the broader multi-county involvement. The Westside RWMG's Coordinating Committee will establish a regular meeting

schedule and develop a more formal organizational structure. Jacques envisions that there will be a project website to communicate information and receive public input on the process. A special “log-in” section can be utilized on the WRA’s website for the TC members to access project information as it is developed. The YCFCWCD will be the fiscal agent and the Solano County Water Agency (SCWA) will be the administrative coordinator for the Westside planning grant.

Jacques informed that the Westside RWMG will not submit a Round 1 Prop. 84 Implementation grant application by the January 7<sup>th</sup> deadline and summarized the project selection process for Yolo County. Only Yolo and Solano counties were eligible to apply for an implementation grant based on DWR’s criteria. The WRA’s draft 2020 priority project list was distributed to illustrate the varying readiness of projects to pursue planning or implementation grant funding based on the status of a project’s progress. Any project that has activity in the concept, planning, feasibility, preliminary design or environmental (CEQA, NEPA) stages would be considered in the “planning” funding phase. Any project that has activity in the final design, permitting, construction bidding, construction/implementation or operation stages would be considered in the “implementation” funding phase. In early November, the WRA TC was sent an email alerting them to the upcoming Round 1 Prop. 84 implementation grant funding deadline. All interested lead partners were asked to submit proposals for projects to be considered for the Prop. 84 implementation grant opportunity. Everyone was given the same set of criteria to meet to be eligible for participation. There were two projects that met the criteria. The WRA Technical Committee held two meetings that included an opportunity to discuss all project proposals, the grant application process and the intent to submit the two proposed projects to the Westside RWMG for consideration on the grant application. The final decision will be made by the Westside RWMG. Both projects submitted by the YCFC&WCD and Putah Creek (LPCCC) decided not to pursue implementation grant funds at this time. Overall, there was a short timeline between DWR’s release of the final grant guidelines and the application deadline in order to discuss/vet eligible projects and prepare a competitive grant application. Both Jacques and Tim addressed the question raised during the public comment section of the meeting and the transparency of the decision-making process which was duly noted by the WRA TC.

### **9. Discuss WRA Board Actions from November 15<sup>th</sup> Meeting:**

- a) WRA Technical Committee Input on issues for 2011 CAP-to-CAP: The planning committees are preparing information and white papers for the April CAP-to-CAP trip. The Davis-Woodland Water Supply Project will be one of the highlighted projects for 2011. Jacques will be participating this year in the water resources category. Tim will be active in the flood protection committee. Cindy Tuttle is also an active participant. Bill Marble asked this to be a standing item on the TC agenda to ensure that WRA agencies were coordinating with the CAP-to-CAP effort.
- b) Discuss suggested Board meeting topic - Yolo County flood management coordination & integration: There is an April 30<sup>th</sup> deadline for the Prop. 84 flood management grant application. Stefan will work with Fran Borcalli, floodSAFE Yolo, to determine whether there are Yolo County projects that could pursue the \$30 million grant opportunity. Jacques requested a February update on the status of pursuing these grant funds.

### 10. YOLO COUNTY IRWMP UPDATE PROCESS:

- a) Discuss priority prioritization process: Cindy Tuttle prepared a sample project prioritization process based on the Yolo County Transportation District's process. She distributed a draft process adapted to the WRA. This process is meant to assist in selecting the most appropriate priority projects for grant opportunities. The TC reviewed the draft process and agreed to discuss again after further study. Cindy was asked to prepare a flow chart and forward to Donna. This draft process will be presented to the WRA Executive Committee for comment at their next meeting.
  
- b) Finalize 2010-2020 Priority List for January WRA Board review: A draft 2020 list with simplified information will be presented to the WRA Board at their January meeting for discussion and comments. The TC agreed to hold a second TC meeting as a working session on January 20<sup>th</sup> to update the IRWMP actions list. Input from all the Integrated Project lead partners is welcome and needed. A revised final list will be presented the WRA Board in March.

Dear Senator Wolk:

The Water Resources Association of Yolo County (WRA) supports your bill, SB 133, related to the Yolo County Cache Creek Resources Management Plan (CCRMP). This important piece of legislation extends the sunset date of Public Resources Code Section 2715.5 to December 2026, thereby allowing the CCRMP in conjunction with site-specific project plans to serve as the functional equivalent of a reclamation plan under the Surface Mining and Reclamation Act (SMARA) for implementation of the CCRMP in lower Cache Creek. This sunset date coincides with the expiration of the permits for the off-channel mining operations that provide revenue for the in-channel restoration and maintenance projects governed by the CCRMP.

Yolo County has adopted a local ordinance governing non-commercial in-channel activities since the last sunset extension was granted. As required by the Public Resources Code, this ordinance was subsequently approved by the State Mining and Geology Board and deemed consistent with state policy. By continuing to allow the CCRMP to fulfill the reclamation plan requirements of SMARA, SB 133 will allow Yolo County to undertake vital habitat enhancement, channel maintenance, and flood control projects in Lower Cache Creek in a streamlined and timely manner.


The DWWSP will improve water quality for the cities of Davis and Woodland and the University of California, Davis and will reduce salt discharges from local wastewater facilities into the California Bay-Delta system. The DWWSP is expected to generate up to 2,000 jobs in our region and can be completed by 2016 with adequate funding.

The RD 2035 Sacramento River Intake project will construct a state-of-the-art fish screen to protect the fish populations in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta system. The RD 2035 intake is the largest remaining unscreened intake on the Sacramento River and should be a top federal funding priority.

The member agencies of the WRA include the Cities of Davis, West Sacramento, Winters, and Woodland; Dunnigan Water District; Reclamation Districts No. 2035 and 108; University of California, Davis; County of Yolo; Colusa County Water District and the Yolo County Flood Control and Water Conservation District.

Thank you for your interest in our top priority regional projects. Federal funding support would help these projects be completed in a timely manner. We strongly encourage you to support maintaining current water infrastructure funding in the Federal Budget process while possibly encouraging additional infrastructure funding to help stimulate the economy.
